# Driver T2/11405 Frederick Henry Moseley Age 36 Royal Army Service Corps, transferred to Royal Field Artillery 

Died from pneumonia, as a consequence of influenza, in Salonika, Greece, $5^{\text {th }}$ January, 1919

Buried in Sofia War Cemetery, Sofia, Bulgaria

Commemorated on Harthill and Kiveton Park Colliery War Memorials

Frederick was a Collier and he was born in Peterborough 1893, the son of Nathan and Annie Moseley. He lived at Firvale, Harthill, and married Alice Wilkinson on $21^{\text {st }}$ June 1902, at All Hallows Church. After his marriage he continued to live at Firvale with his wife Alice, his daughters; Violet, Lily, Rose and Nellie, and his son John Henry. His 20 year-old brother John Henry Moseley also lived with the family.

## Driver Frederick Moseley

"After a considerable service in France, the Dardanelles and Salonica, the death bas occurred at the last named place, from pneumonia followed upon influenza of Driver Frederick Moseley, R.F.A., of Firvale, Harthill. Driver Moseley was 36 years of age and leaves a widow and six children, the oldest who is sixteen.

He enlisted on September 2nd 1914 prior to which he worked as a miner at Kiveton Park Colliery.

He was sent to France a fortnight after joining up and went there for some months when he was wounded. On recovery be took part in the operations of the Dardanelles and was invalided home suffering from shell shock. Later, be was again in France and some time ago was drafted to Salonica, where he died on January $5^{\text {th }}$.
The poor fellow was looking forward to shortly returning home, when he was taken ill. He bad the Mons Star and ribbon and was a good soldier. The Chaplain of the hospital who attended him in his last illness speaks very bighly of him. He was well known in Firvale and much sympathy is expressed with his widow and children. Frederick's two brothers bave also served and were discharged recently."
